Lesson 58: Silent Letters

Phonics Rule: Anytime K comes before N, the K is silent.



Silent K

Note these homophones (words that sound the exactly the same, but have different meanings):

A "nit" is an egg of head lice insects.

To "knit" is to create an article made out of yarn.

(The "silent k" allows you to see the difference in the words.)

"Not" is a negative word, as in I am not angry.

A "knot" is a fastening made by tying two things together.

(The "silent k" shows the difference.)

"No" is a negative word.

To "know" is to be sure about something; to have the facts about something.

The "night" is when the moon and stars shine.

A "knight" is a warrior who is given a military rank of honor.

To "need" is to require something.

To "knead" bread is to press and squeeze the dough before baking.

Phonics Rule: Most of the "Silent B" words come after the letter "M", as in "comb", although there are a few words where it comes before a "T."
