

Lesson 50: EY says “E”

Phonics Rule: EY is a vowel team used at the end of words. Sometimes, the first vowel says its name sound (long sound), “E”, and the Y is silent, as in “key”. Other times, in a small list of words, EY says “A”, as in “obey”.

EY=E

hockey attorney trolley alley

PRACTICE:

A Humble KING on a Donkey

Matthew 21:1-17, Contemporary English Version

Note: The small numbers indicate the verses of Scripture. Students will notice the numbers, but should not read them.

21 When Jesus and his disciples came near Jerusalem, he went to Beth/**phage** on the Mount of Olives and sent two of them on



ahead. ² He told them, “Go into the next village, where you will at once find a **donkey** and her colt. Untie the two **donkeys** and bring them to me. ³ If anyone asks why you are doing this, just say, ‘The Lord needs them.’ He will at once let you have the **donkeys**.”

⁴ So God's promise came true, just as the prophet had said,

⁵ “Announce to the people of Jerusalem:

‘Your king is coming to you!

He is humble

and rides on a **donkey**.

He comes on the colt

of a **donkey**.’ ”

⁶ The disciples left and did what Jesus had told them to do. ⁷ They brought the **donkey** and its colt and laid some clothes on their backs. Then Jesus got on.

⁸ Many people spread clothes in the road, while others put down branches which they had cut from trees. ⁹ Some people walked ahead of Jesus and others followed behind. They were all shouting,

“[Hosanna!!! Glory to GOD who saves us!!!!]

Hooray for the Son of David!

God bless the one who comes

in the name of the Lord.

Hooray for God

in heaven above!”

¹⁰ When Jesus came to Jerusalem, everyone in the city was excited and asked, “Who can this be?”

¹¹ The crowds answered, “This is Jesus, the prophet from Nazareth in Galilee.”

¹² Jesus went into the temple and chased out everyone who was selling or buying. He turned over the tables of the **mon/ey/chan/gers** and the benches of the ones who were selling doves. ¹³ He told them, “The Scriptures say, ‘My house should be called a place of worship.’ But you have turned it into a place where robbers hide.”

¹⁴ Blind and lame people came to Jesus in the temple, and he healed them. ¹⁵ But the chief priests and the teachers of the Law of Moses were angry when they saw his miracles and heard the children shouting praises to the Son of David. ¹⁶ The men said to Jesus, “Don't you hear what those children are saying?”

“Yes, I do!” Jesus answered. “Don't you know that the Scriptures say, ‘Children and infants will sing praises’?” ¹⁷ Then Jesus left the city and went out to the village of Bethany, where he spent the night.

3. What did JESUS say His house should be?
4. What did JESUS say that children and infants will do?

PRACTICE:

Hey! Do you have time to take a **survey** for the Kennel Club?
