Lesson 50: EY says "E"

Phonics Rule: EY is a vowel team used at the end of words. Sometimes, the first vowel says its name sound (long sound), "E", and the Y is silent, as in "key". Other times, in a small list of words, EY says "A", as in "obey".

He turned over the tables of the mon/ey/chan/gers and the benches of the ones who were selling doves. ¹³ He told them, "The Scriptures say, 'My house should be called a place of worship.' But you have turned it into a place where robbers hide."
