## **Lesson 54: Contractions**

Grammar Rule: Contractions are made up of two words that are shortened to make one word. One or more letters are left out and an apostrophe is substituted for the letter or letters dropped. Contractions are a more informal form of English, and are used in informal speech. When one writes a formal paper, use the two original words instead of the contraction.

Directions: Have the student say the two words and then the contraction so they are familiar with the meaning of the contraction.
