Lessons 12: Shortcuts ăn ĕn ŏn ĭn ŭn

Phonics Focus: In phonics, a shortcut is a sequence of letters frequently used together. Once a student learns to recognize these patterns, he will no longer need to sound out the individual letters. He will simply recognize the shortcut and say it.

Many words are made up of these shortcuts. Write them on cards and drill them until they are learned. Look for them in words, books, newspapers, and magazines. Print the page of shortcuts and let the student find the shortcuts and circle them. Also have the student underline the blends. The teacher should dictate the sounds and have the student write out the shortcuts saying the sound as they write them. Then sound out the single-syllable words. For the multisyllable words, just have them circle the shortcuts. It is never too early to help build the student's vocabulary. If the student does not know what a word means, explain it and talk about the word. Use them in sentences. If a word has multiple meanings, discuss those as well.
